## Sexual Assault

- **Every 2 minutes**, someone in the U.S. is sexually assaulted.

- **1 in 6 women and 1 in 33 men** have experienced an attempted or completed rape.
- **72% of victims** are sexually assaulted by **someone they know**.

- An estimated **20% to 25% of college women** in the United States experience attempted or complete rape during their college career.

## Dating Violence

- **Women ages 16-24** experience the highest per capita rates of intimate partner violence.
- **21% of college students report** they have experienced **dating violence by a current partner**. **32%** report dating violence **by a previous partner**.

- Intimate Partner Violence resulted in **2,340 deaths in 2007**. Of these deaths, 70% were females and 30% were males.

## Domestic Violence

- Domestic violence is one of the most **chronically underreported** crimes.
- **1 in every 4 women** will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.
- **30% to 60% of perpetrators** of intimate partner violence also abuse children in the household.
- **Females who are 20-24 years of age are at the greatest risk of nonfatal intimate partner violence**.

## Stalking

- **1 in 12 women and 1 in 45 men** will be stalked in their lifetime.
- **81% of women** stalked by a current or former intimate partner are also physically assaulted by that partner.
- On average, stalking continues for **1.8 years; 2.2 years** if the stalking involves intimate partners.
- **80% of campus stalking victims knew their stalkers**.
